## February Meeting Minutes

**Welcome** – The meeting was called to order by President Charles Gilreath at 7 p.m. at the Brazos Center.

**Minutes** – A correction to the January minutes was noted by Nicole Pavel. The evening bee cuddle quilt demonstration at First Baptist Church was held January 17<sup>th</sup> instead of scheduled for February 17<sup>th</sup> as reported in the minutes. The corrected minutes were approved.

**Treasurer's Report** – Benita Ebel reported a January 31<sup>st</sup> checking account balance of \$15,418.40 and a savings account balance of \$16,846.94, with a combined total of \$32,265.34.

Membership – Maggie McGuire reported there were 63 members, 1 visitor and 2 new members in attendance. She said 134 members are now signed up on MyGrove, and asked anyone who has had difficulty with the new software program to contact her. Door prizes were won by Marjean Neve, Jane Goetz and Nelda Cohan.

Sunshine and Shadows – Charles Gilreath reported six cards were sent last month for shadows. Kerry Dwyer mentioned that the guild was advised via Facebook that past longtime member Grace Reed, who had handled Sunshine and Shadows and was active in the guild at one time, passed away 10/25/16. She will be included in the memorial that is part of the Quilt Show. Sherrill Johnson was happy to announce a sunshine event: a great grandchild on the way.

Dallas Bus Trip – Jeanne Rierson reported that 20 spaces are still available for the Dallas quilt show bus trip on March 11th. She will run an ad in the local newspaper this weekend to see if others in the community would be interested and to help fill the spots that are open.

**Summer Retreat** – Rowena Reed announced that the summer retreat is now full. Members can be added to a waiting list by calling Peggy Mobley.

Programs – Alma Fonseca mentioned she had extra handouts from the last meeting that outline the upcoming workshops. Theresa Morrison has added a workshop in August to make boutique items for the Quilt Show (date and location pending). Fran Gray reported that spaces are available for the March workshop by Maggie Ball and the April workshop by Dot Collins.

**Habitat Banners** – Nancy Searcy reported that the workshop held to make banners was a lot of fun and

netted 5 finished banners. She brought a selection of banners to show the group.

**Donation Quilt** – The donation quilt raised \$280 at the GoTexan event and \$282 at the Antique Show.

**Quilt Show** – Charles Gilreath announced the first meeting for the Show chairpeople was held end of January, and they will meet the last Tuesday of each month prior to the Show. Linda Winder announced the theme of the challenge quilts is "You Could Be Swinging on a Star"; she read the lyrics to the song to the members and added each entry must include stars and a mule, fish, pig or monkey. There is no entry fee for a challenge quilt; first, second and third place winning challenge quilts will be auctioned and all others donated as Care Quilts. Quilts are to be 45 x 45 inches and do not need a sleeve. Charles reminded the group that Sue Idol (White Elephant) and JoAnn Williams (set up/take down) need someone to shadow them as this will be their last term as chairpersons in these respective areas. Sue Idol asked the group not to send any more "home dec" or upholstery fabric for the White Elephant booth – quilting cotton fabric only.

**Adjournment** – Charles Gilreath closed the business meeting at 7:30 p.m. Alma Fonseca introduced guest speaker **Diane Rose**, who provided the program for the evening.


