Kim suggested that Brazos Bluebonnet Quilt Guild could possibly help. President Denise Mackan contacted a few members. Laura North coordinated the project. She drafted two patterns and copied them to 5-6 people, wrote and dispersed instructions to 6-7 volunteers, made 7-8 gowns as samples, and

then cut out 60 gowns for others to sew.

Virtual Mini Quilt Show Entry Guidelines

Hello fellow BBQG members! I know many of you (myself included) have been busy constructing gowns, face masks, and head caps for the hospitals and other medical and assisted living facilities. Face mask construction has also been completed for ourselves, family, and friends.

Now it's time for some fun! Think about constructing a charity quilt for the Virtual Mini Quilt Show. This is a time you can use your imagination to create a one of a kind quilt your recipient will love. Your quilt may inspire other quilters to step out of the box, and have fun with design and color. Almost anything goes as far as your choice of construction, but please make sure everything is carefully secured, as it may go to a young child. It can be pieced, appliqué (hand or machine), fused and thread painted, and other techniques, or a combination. Make sure it is at least 42" X 42".

The only rule is your quilt must make a nod to the LOG CABIN. This can be a traditional log cabin block quilt or a log cabin variation such as pineapple, courthouse steps, corner log cabin, rhombus log cabin, hexagon log cabin...you get the idea and the list is long. You can also include blocks other than the log cabin, as long as your log cabin design is the dominant block. You can also take "log cabin" literally, and appliqué or piece an actual log cabin...just go with it! We are excited to see what you come up with.

Just a bit more:

- As in the past, the guilts are donated to the guild, to be used for community service.
- The top three winners' quilts: Will be auctioned off to the highest bidder. (guild member)
- Top three winners: Receive a ribbon and a prize
- New category BBQG Board Choice: Winner will receive a ribbon.
- Deadline for entry is August 9th at 11pm, but the earlier you turn in pictures and entry form the better, as we have to complete a slideshow for virtual voting.
- Those members without computers will be mailed an entry form with a return address.
- Virtual voting for quilts in the slideshow will open after the July Virtual BBQG meeting.
- The completed slideshow will be presented at the Sept. meeting, and the winners will be announced.
- Watch for the procedure for the auction in a later BBQG Newsletter and on Groupworks.

GO TEXAN quilts are also part of the Virtual Mini Quilt Show. A winner will be chosen in a separate vote, and the winning quilt will compete in Houston. This quilt is NOT a donation or auction item. To enter, simply add "GO TEXAN" in

parenthesis after your quilt name on the entry form for the Virtual Mini Quilt Show. These quilts will be added at the end of the slideshow as separate voting item/s.

Mary Ellen Bell..."Being a senior and living alone, I enjoy sewing for charity projects. The gowns were definitely a different project. I'm glad I answered Laura's call for help. Right now I've been at home 11 weeks as high risk by the Dr. and these projects have kept me busy. Charles kept me busy with kits for Books and a Blanket after my 7th knee surgery. He would bring me kits and pick up the finished products. Right now I have 17 "blankets for books and a blanket" and 1 Quilt of Valor for the veterans ready to go. Hopefully, I will be able to start attending meetings when they start again."

Laura North... "I made 20-25 face masks from scraps (material provided by SW) And 175 more masks and gave them to friends and businesses. Made 30 surgical caps from my own fabric in response to Marjean Neve's request (her daughter works for SW). Made 390 caps from my own materials to send to my son, a nurse in Washington DC at the hospital where he was born. Made 60 more caps from fabric donated by Quilt n' Peace Bee and buttons donated by By Mary Ellen Bell."

Kathy Loflin..."I've taken several classes since we've moved here and I am a fairly new quilter. My favorites tend to run towards the more modern quilts and into the "Art Quilts" area. I have a couple of RaNae Merrill's books and when the Guild signed her on to teach a class, I quickly signed up. I was not disappointed. She has a bubbling personality and seemed to keep those of us who attended very interested in what she had to say. She taught me to bring together fabrics I never would have ventured putting next to each other, much less in the same quilt. Her teaching methods were such that the 2-day class passed so quickly I felt even a 5-day class would only have touched upon the tip of the iceberg in her knowledge of putting together quilts. The time she spent working with individuals was very surprising since, as a student, I didn't expect her one-on-one help. I loved the class and would take another with her if she ever teaches another pattern."

Anonymous...Did you reprioritize your UFOs? "No - just dug them out so I can better stare at them..."

JoAnn Williams: What is the most unique item in your sewing space? "Lots of jigsaw puzzles", Who is your favorite quilting teacher? "Becky Goldsmith and Eleanor Burns"

Other...list some....."drank morning coffee every day, never sewed my finger even though I was sewing so so very fast, bought a new sewing chair with money made from masks, and WISHED for a quilt retreat! I'd be happy quarantining with 6-12 friends."
